

Getting Ready for Summer Reading & Hosting Summer Programs for All Ages

Community Library Offers Patrons New York State Empire Pass Kits.

This summer the Community Library is offering New York State Empire Passes for patrons to check out.

The Empire Pass is your key to all-season enjoyment at New York State Parks. It provides unlimited day-use vehicle entry to most facilities operated by New York State Parks and the State Dept. of Environmental Conservation including forests, beaches, trails, and more. Use the pass locally at Clark Reservation and Green Lakes State Park.

The Empire Pass Kits have a 3 day loan period to accommodate patrons taking weekend trips. If you're new to New York State parks, each Empire Pass Kit includes a complete guide to all the facilities you can visit.

The library has 4 passes available to patrons and will be available for check-out beginning May 25th. For more information on use guidelines, please inquire at our Information Desk.

The CLD&J Art in the Library Features Jamie Ashlaw

For the month of March, the Community Library of DeWitt & Jamesville's Art in the Library features local artist Jamie Ashlaw.

Jamie Ashlaw finds inspiration in classic American signage and vintage package design. His images are inspired by the neon tubes, typography, and quirky shapes that direct us where to eat, bowl a few frames, or stay for the night. Greatly influenced by graphic design, Jamie distills his layouts down to their essential characteristics. With colors as bold as the layout, the realistic portrayal of light and shadow captivates while the painterly quality soothes the senses. A combination of realistic acrylic painting and traditional sign painting techniques produce work that is vivid, luminescent, and bold.

Community Library to Launch Digital Design Station for 3d Printing & Media Conversion

As part of the Library's new "Digital Gateway" initiative, the Community Library of DeWitt & Jamesville is launching a Digital Design Station in The HIVE makerspace. This new service will assist patrons who wish to convert old media or learn 3D design in conjunction with the library's 3D printer. The Digital Design Station, available for use beginning in May 2018, lets patrons perform different digitization and design functions including digitization of photos and VHS tapes, 3D modelling, and 3D scanning.

With the Digital Design Station, patrons can convert VHS home movies to DVD, or an electronic file transferred to a USB drive. Electronic photos can be easily shared with friends and family by email, Facebook, or other image sharing platform, and videos can be uploaded to YouTube, distributed on multiple DVD copies, or stored on a portable drive. The station features a desktop computer with enhanced graphics hardware, two scanners, a VHS/DVD combo drive, TV, and Elgato video conversion hardware.

The enhanced graphics capability of the station allows patrons to create complex 3D images with Tinkercad or Sculpttris, scan 3D ob-



jects using the Kinect 360 camera, and print them on our Lulzbot 3D printer.

The library's staff has created guides for the Digital Design Station's major functions for patrons of all levels of technical proficiency to use in conversion or creation activities. These guides feature easy-to-follow, explanatory pictures and are available for photo scanning, 3D printing, VHS to DVD conversion, and technical troubleshooting.

Limited assistance is available by booking a one-on-one tech appointment and specifying design station assistance. The Digital Design Station kit can be borrowed with a valid library card at the Information Desk. Community Library Focus on Safety & Security

As part of the Library's focus on safety and security, Library staff participated in a Staff Development Workshop on May 3rd presented by Community Liaison Officer Brittany Mangano of the DeWitt Police Department.

Officer Mangano covered general safety strategies for working in a public environment; responding to an active shooter or other emergency; addressing medical emergencies, and; defusing difficult situations. Staff then had an opportunity to practice some of the strategies discussed in the workshop and ask questions. We are very grateful to Officer Mangano and the DeWitt Police Department for their ongoing interest and support.

In addition to the Staff Development workshop, the Library is engaged in a number of

other initiatives to ensure that the Library remains a safe and welcoming environment. We have completed a Security Guide for staff, implemented ePanic internal alert software on staff computers, and have begun developing guidelines for safe use of the Library's outdoor areas.

We'll continue to update you as we explore other ways to promote safety and security at the Library.
